Fall is the best time for planting trees and shrubs. Those planted in the fall will establish roots through the fall and into winter even after they have lost their leaves. There is minimal risk of transplant shock and they will be ready to take off and grow next spring and will be well established for the hot summer. It is the best time to plant.

The inventory is full. Looks really good. The weather is cooling down. It's time to do fall planting. September and October are the best times for planting.

> Winter vegetables are now available.

Bare root berries and vegetables such as asparagus and artichokes and rhubarb will be here in November.

Bare root roses will be here in December usually before Christmas.

Oregon stock such as Dogwoods and live Christmas trees will be here in mid to late November.

GARDENING TIPS FOR FALL 2014

Fall is the Best Time to Plant **Trees** – Trees are the foundation of the landscaping in your yard, and are valuable in many ways. They provide shade in the summer, and if they are deciduous, allow the sun to warm the area in the winter, thereby reducing cooling and heating costs. They remove carbon dioxide and replenish the air with oxygen to benefit both man and animals. They provide habitat for both birds and other animals. They break the wind and their root structure helps to stabilize the soil, thus reducing erosion. Planting a tree in the fall as it is going dormant gives it an advantage over a spring planted tree because it is going dormant, its rest period for the year. The soil is warm from the summer heat and will retain some of the warmth until about December. It will gain root growth because of the warm soil, then the fall and winter rains will provide moisture for the soil allowing the roots to expand and they will continue to arow slowly even in the cold soil. When spring arrives it has a quite well developed root system to nurture all of the new growth as it goes into the warmer weather. A tree planted in the spring is trying to establish a root system and nurture all the new growth at the same time and probably will not grow as quickly.

Planting Groundcovers – Groundcovers are most easily started in the spring before the summer heat or in the fall when the heat of summer is waning but before it gets cold. That can be a narrow window, so don't put it off if you are planning such a project. We usually have some groundcovers available, and we can special order them for you depending on their availability.

Fall Cleanup – Leaves will be changing to their fall color on many trees - some just turn brown, others packages soon. turn red, yellow, orange and other beautiful hues, but most will finally drop all of those leaves - nature's plan. Enjoy the color and later enjoy the nice compost they become. If you rake leaves, consider making a compost pile of them if you don't have one. Add grass clippings and plant clippings to the pile for nitrogen and moisture. Leaves are also good for winter mulching of plants that need protection from the cold. Tired and dead foliage should be cleaned up from summer annuals. Perennials can be divided for enlarging your garden, or for swapping with friends for more variety.

Winter Vegetable Gardens -This is the time to be getting those cool weather vegetable plants in the ground. The root vegetables such as carrots, radishes, beets and turnips are most often planted from seed. Peas of all kinds can be planted from seed – pod peas, snow peas, snap peas. (And not a vegetable, but don't forget to plant your sweet peas.) We will try to keep a good supply of broccoli, Brussel's sprouts, cabbage, cauliflower, Swiss chard, spinach, lettuce , kale and collards available as starts ready to go into the ground.

Dormant Spray – Dormant spray for fungal diseases of fruit trees, such as curly leaf and fire blight, is due soon. The suggested proper times are Thanksgiving or late November, Christmas or late December, and Valentine's Day, or mid February. All the leaves should have fallen off the trees and debris should be cleaned up from under the trees before spraying. The spray must dry on the tree to be effective, so try to avoid rainy or very foggy days. Copper spray is the suggested spray to use for this purpose. Mix a horticultural oil with it so that it clings to the branches.

Plant Winter Annuals for Winter Color – Cold weather annuals should be planted soon in order to become established before the weather turns very cold. Root growth is much slower in very cold soil, and though they will survive, they probably will provide more color if planted earlier. Pansies, calendula, violas, flowering kale, snapdragons and primroses are among those annuals that thrive in the cold weather.

2015 Season Seeds – We should have a fresh supply of California Poppy seeds, California Wildflower Mix, and Blue Lupine seeds available in ¼# packages soon.

Our seed rack has just been supplied with 2015 season flower and vegetable seeds, including a nice selection of organic vegetable seeds.

This is also a good time to spread grass seed on areas of the lawn that might have bare spots.

Fall Fertilizing – September is the best time for that in order for the plants to store food to carry them through the winter months. It can still be done if the leaves on the trees or plants have not started changing to fall colors or falling off. It can be a waste of effort and fertilizer since the plants will not fully utilize the fertilizer without working leaves.
